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

There are many ways one could prevent fraud, here are some tips that were shared by our cybersecurity trainer, Dr. Vik Tor Goh.

### **STEPS TO PREVENT FRAUD:**

- 1. Use str ong passw ords with a mixtu re of upper and lo wercase and alphanumeric cha ra cters. Check passw ord str ength at: https://h owsecu re ism ypassw ord.net/
- 2. Keep track of y our spending r egular ly
- 3. Igno re fraud calls or hang up immediatel y. For assistance, call CSM 2 4-hour emer gency hotline : 019-2665850

Supernum Bakery is one of the Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) projects initiated by Rotary Club Petaling Jaya (RCPJ), Sun Media and Sweet Passion Corner. SuperMum Bakery was commenced in early 2015 when Harjit Singh, the former president of Rotary Club Petaling Jaya (RCPJ) wanted to ship a total of RM120,000 commercial-scale baking equipment to Acheh, but due to strict and lengthy procedures, the project took place in Malaysia instead.

The objective of this programme is to train single mothers to bake bread, cookies, and cakes with the goal of setting up their own business. The trainees will undergo a four-month training to ensure that they are ready to enter the workforce. As part of the initiative of Asian Banking School to make a positive impact on the society, team Avengers was assigned to untangle the existing issues of the programme. We revised the recruitment process, training materials and posttraining opportunities. RCPJ hopes that more single mothers will come forward to utilise this platform to build a stable and sustainable future for themselves and their loved ones.

Jeffrey Sani Ting, a fellow Avenger, shared "I understand the struggles of being a single mother better now. A single mother will always need to have a good balance between working to earn a sufficient income and taking great care of her children by themselves independently. I strongly believe that this project is a very positive cause, giving the opportunity for single mothers to learn new skills, to help and support their earnings".

During our visit to the bakery, we met Venni. After being widowed for two years, Venni decided to master a new skill to ease her grief. "I lost my husband due to a car accident and need to take care of my two children.

Fortunately, I discovered SuperMum Bakery Project through my acquaintance." She was delighted that the programme not only helped her therapeutically but also gave her an opportunity to learn how to bake and earn from it. Venni is a part time florist and with the baking skills she got from the programme, she is now including cakes to her flower delivery service.

## **Jom Belajar!** Empowering Orang Asli with education By Calvin Swah

he community of Orang Asli in Malaysia is encountering several risks that threaten their lives and longevity. They rely heavily on hunting and fruit picking in the jungle but deforestations in the area are making it hard for them to grow food and get a clean water supply. This circumstance is made worse when the community overlooks the importance of education among the younger generation. This situation hinders them from securing a job in the cities nearby.

Empowering Orang Asli is one of the social enterprise projects launched by the ELITE Community Association (ELITE). The premier objective of this association is to create a sustainable life for the Orang Asli community. The project owner, Alice Lim said "we are dedicated to raising awareness about the importance of education for the children in the future among the community of Orang Asli, besides educating them on the opportunities available in the city."

On 26th of May 2019 (Sunday), we organized a "Jom Belajar" event at Sekolah Vokasional ELITE in Kampung Sungai Chedon, Tapah. The main purpose of this event is to promote the Elite After-School Programme. The After-School Programme is a classroom-based learning session for the children to improve on their academic especially on the subject of English, Mathematics and Bahasa Malaysia. ELITE expects this programme will continue to assist Orang Asli children in learning and discover more potential for their future.

The Orang Asli parents were encouraged to participate more in school activities, interact with teachers and keep themselves updated with their children's progress. Parents were also encouraged to help their children have an interest in reading to help them speak both English and Bahasa Melayu fluently. Many fun activities were also prepared for the children. The event was made special by the villagers as they came together to cook a meal for all that attended.

me but it's definitely a useful tool to survive the tech storm.


### Wendy:


